Reflections and insights from St. Luke's International University students who participated in the two-day International Study Program in the College of Nursing, University of the Philippines, Manila

As nursing students are able to perform medical procedures and have an educational plan that allows them to serve in a hospital and immediately become independent while still in the university, they specialize in acute care and made me think that if the range of work for nurses in Japan increases, more people could be saved in the event of an earthquake or other disasters. In my interactions with local residents, I realized that the towns are very warm, with many people greeting me when I walked around and helping me without me having to say anything. I was truly helped by the teachers, students who participated in the training, Filipino people, and many other people. I would like to visit again and participate in volunteer activities so that as many people as possible can live healthy lives.

At the University of the Philippines College of Nursing (UPCN) in Manila, I was exposed to a clinical-integrated learning environment, and I also became aware of the healthcare system and maternal healthcare of the country. The UPCN students are trained to become work-ready nurses in the hospital. Their experiences as nursing students are quite different from ours in Japan, so it was eye opening what they are learning in 4 years. I think it is significant to ponder upon how the UPCN students' abundant experiences bolster their confidence. My learning time in the Philippines, as well as my numerous observations and realizations, were truly valuable experiences which foster my personal growth.

In this international study program and nursing training, I was impressed by the high level of nursing education in the College of Nursing at the University of the Philippines (UP) in Manila. At the same time, I was also exposed to health disparities due to poverty. At UP, I felt that the level of nursing education is rather high, not only in terms of practicing basic nursing skills in hospital training, but also in terms of practical exercises such as working as a leader among nurses and using simulation dolls and mannequins. On the other hand, I was shocked to meet people living in harsh environments completely different from those of Japan. Needless to say, there are still many social problems in Japan. I felt again that it is important in my future life to have an attitude of always continuing to learn, rather than pretending to be ignorant and avoiding issues of social concern.
